## **Nutcrackers mean Christmas at the Goad home**

ANTHONY AND RENATE Goad met on a blind date in Stuttgart, Germany. Anthony, known as Tony, was in the Army, and a friend of Renate's wanted her to meet the American soldier.

The friend convinced Renate to go on a blind date. But, when the time came, Renate wasn't so sure she wanted to follow through, so she stood Tony up. In fact, she did that three times. Tony must have thought she was worth the wait because he kept coming back, hoping for the promised date. Once they did go out, things clicked and a short time later, the two were married.

"We were married twice," Renate says. "The first time at the courthouse,

and the second time in the military chapel."

It wasn't easy for the young woman to leave her family, her country and the only life she had ever known. Stuttgart is a city about the size of Philadelphia, and she was moving to Manns Choice, Pa.

"My family wasn't too happy with me," she remembers. "But, I had to follow my heart."

Renate says Tony's family made it easy for her.

"His mother and sister were absolute sweethearts," she remembers. "They made me feel welcome right from the start."

Some years later Tony, Renate



and their two sons, Steve and Scott, moved into their newly built home on Business Route 220 about three miles south of Bedford Springs.

Their home has always been one of the first in the neighborhood decorated for Christmas. Christmas is a big holiday in Germany with lots of traditions, and Renate was happy to bring those traditions to the U.S.

"I missed Christmas at home," she

says. "I still get teary-eyed when I hear 'Silent Night."

Over the years, the Goads have made many trips back to Germany and they still try to go annually. All of Renate's family is gone with the exception of her younger sister.

"We weren't close when I left, but we are now," she says.

While the outside of the Goad home is always a holiday attraction, the inside is a Christmas delight. There are two trees, always a real one and an artificial one. The artificial one is covered with snow and red cardinals. The other tree, hand-selected in Breezewood, is decorated with many craft items, including some from Germany.

Tony and Renate enjoy attending Christkindl fairs, especially one in Mifflinburg. Some time during their travels, the Goads fell in love with authentic German nutcrackers. While they can't remember when the collection began, they do remember the first two they purchased. They are large, probably about 36 inches, and expertly crafted.

Their nutcracker collection quickly grew, expanding to more than 300. Most of the year, the nutcrackers are stored in their original, individ-

ual boxes but come late November, just like in the musical, the nutcrackers come to life. Beautifully handcrafted wooden creations nearly fill the dining/living space of the Goad home.

Artists' names include Steinbach and Ulbricht, both well-known German nutcracker artisans, and they own a snowman nutcracker by Kathe Wohlfahrt. Steinbach nutcrackers are made in Hohenhamein, Germany.

"The German nutcrackers have much better workmanship," Renate explains.

At the Goad house, there are tiny nutcrackers that line the windowsill, medium-sized ones that fill the hutch and shelves, and large ones that stand on the floor. It is a Christmas scene to equal a museum display.

Originally, nutcrack-

ers were designed with a particular person, such as a policeman, teacher or politician, in mind. Ulbricht nutcrackers have their origin with miners.

Many years ago, when the mines began to close in Germany, many of the miners became woodcarvers. Among them, Otto Ulbricht rose to the top with nutcracker creations.

While Renate and Tony keep telling themselves they have plenty of nutcrackers, each year they find themselves adding at least one more to their collection. And each year, they look forward to bringing the boxes up from the basement and feel just a bit sad when each nutcracker is placed in its individual box for storage the rest of the year.
